



Dear brothers and sister in Christ,

Greetings from the CSI Diocese of Malabar.

I am happy to learn from your letter that the CSI North American Council is bringing out a souvenir on the occasion of 31st Annual CSI North American Family and Youth Conference, which will be held at Toronto, Canada from 06-09 July 2017.

At the outset, let me congratulate you for your choice of the theme for deliberation in the conference. The theme dwells on some powerful words that hinges around life,i.e.,celebration, abundance and fruitfulness. It takes significance especially in our global context when the three taken in its face value seemingly are in the possession of a minority, and for the majority it is a farce. And this scarcely shudder us, the Church as if it is the natural course of life. So the theme is a call for us to reflect its Biblical musing and have it confront us so as to awaken us to see its meanderings in our individualistic consumerist culture.

Abundance is a word that Jesus offers as characteristic of life to all who come to him(John 10:10). This offer of Jesus is in a context of Jesus as the true shepherd as against the false shepherds. The life that Jesus offers is one that nourishes, equips and strengthens as against the others who steals and destroys. Therefore, abundant life is something that enlighten and enlist in us all that is bestowed by the Creator and just as 'life begets life,' the life flowing out through us also enables others to lead a fulfilling life.

The aspect of Fruitfulness or the nine fruits of the Spirit (Gal.5:22, 23) also has a communitarian aspect. The passage teaches that the freedom or life in the Spirit is living for the sake of others: 'to serve one another in love' (Gal.5:13 b). Taken together, the aspect of Abundance and Fruitfulness are attributes that are not inward looking but clearly other oriented. The communitarian meaning offers hope to the hopeless and alienated. It then sets the tone for Celebration of Life for all that life is worth for: A celebration that results from unearthing the diversities and the possibilities all around, thus of admiring the pluralities of expression hidden in humanity.

May the LORD bless the CSI Churches in North America as you reflect on the theme Celebrating Life in its Abundance and Fruitfulness, during the Annual Family and Youth Conference this year.



Our Vicar, Rev. George Jacob, and all the members of the CSI Church, Toronto heartily welcome our conference leaders: the CSI Moderator & Bishop of Madhya Kerala Diocese - the Most Rev. Thomas K. Under the leadership of Rev. George M. John, one of our members who was ordained in 1987, our church began to flourish and we began to have worship services more frequently. In 1994, under the leadership of late Rt. Rev. Michael John (Thirumeni), we were able to host the 8th CSI Family & Youth Conference. It was at this time that we initiated a relationship with the Toronto Anglican Diocese, and were able to rent St. David's Anglican Church till 2010 to conduct our regular worship services. Our membership grew very quickly, and Thirumeni assisted us in maintaining and developing a firm base for our church to move forward and grow.

In 2009 during the Episcopal Visit, Bishop Rt. Rev. Thomas Samuel encouraged us to prepare our congregation to celebrate the 25th Anniversary of our church. Bishop Samuel met with the Suffragan Bishop of the Anglican Diocese of Toronto, Rt. Rev. Philip M. Poole, and discussed the possibility of acquiring a church building for our consistent use. By God's grace, we were able to get this amazing worship facility, with a beautiful sanctuary and a parsonage attached to it, located in a Central community of Toronto. Our first service at our new home was held on January 16th, 2011. We are truly grateful to the Toronto Arch Bishop, Rt. Rev. Colin Johnson, Bishop Rt. Rev. Philip M. Poole, and Bishop Rt. Rev. Thomas Samuel for their tremendous support in making our dream a reality. In 2011, as a faithful worshipping community, we completed another very significant milestone in its journey, and celebrated our Silver Jubilee. We had a year-long celebration with various programs, along with 25 Silver Jubilee projects within our community and abroad, through our Madhya Kerala Diocese.

We are extremely grateful to our Moderator & Bishop Rt. Rev. Thomas K. Oommen for his continued support and prayers for our church. May God Almighty bless Thirumeni and Kochamma abundantly to








BISHOP THOMAS K OOMMEN:

THE MODERATOR OF THE CHURCH OF SOUTH INDIA & THE PRIMATE IN ANGLICAN COMMUNION FROM INDIA



Bishop, The Most Rev. Thomas Kanjirappallil Oommen was elected to the Office of the Moderator of the Church of South India in the 35th session of the Synod of the Church of South India held at the CSI Retreat Centre, Kottayam, Kerala from 2017 January 14 to 17.

The election remains historic since it is for the first time that a Bishop from the Madhya Kerala Diocese is elected as the Moderator. Bishop Thomas K Oommen is the 11th Bishop in the lineage of the Travancore – Cochin Anglican Diocese and the 7th Bishop in CSI Madhya Kerala Diocese. The Moderator is one among the four officials of the CSI Synod and is the chief pastoral supervisor over the 24 Dioceses spread throughout in five states – Kerala, Tamilnadu, Karnataka, Telangana and Andhra Pradesh – of South India and Sri Lanka. The Moderator is privileged to represent CSI in all gathering of its ecumenical partners in India and abroad.

The new office of the Bishop as the Moderator brings more privilege to Madhya Kerala Diocese as the Archbishop of Canterbury, The Most Reverend and Right Honourable Justin Welby has appointed our Moderator and Diocesan Bishop as one of the Primates in the Anglican Communion. Primates in the Anglican Communion hold serious responsibilities as they engage in ministries and responsibilities that will take forward the journey of the Church according to times and contexts.

The Anglican Communion website explains that: "The use of the title PRIMATE in the context of meetings of the Anglican Communion denotes the chief archbishop or bishop of a province of the Anglican Episcopal family of churches. The Primates' Meeting was established in 1978 by Archbishop Donald Coggan (101st Archbishop of Canterbury) as an opportunity for "leisurely thought, prayer and deep consultation" and has met regularly since."

The new election and appointment bring honour and privilege to Madhya Kerala Diocese, it also increases the responsibility to remember the ministry of our beloved Moderator Thirumeni in our prayers.

May our Lord strengthen Thirumeni in His Lordship's ministry as the current chief shepherd of the Church of South India. May the Church of South India increase in its witness and mission.

Let the Church in this age continue to give hope and joy to the world presenting the life and light of Jesus Christ, our Saviour and Lord, under the pastoral leadership and guidance of the Most Rev. Thomas K Oommen, our Moderator.




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

The word of God is clear about this – it urges a Christian to deny himself, take up his cross, and follow Jesus. Then Jesus told his disciples, "If any want to become my followers, let them deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me. – (Matthew 16:24 NRSV) John 10:10 says, "I came that they may have life, and have it abundantly." (NRSV) The abundance of this world is usually at loggerheads with the abundance of life in Jesus Christ. That's why Paul considered everything as a loss because of the surpassing value of knowing Christ Jesus. The true Christian life takes its sustenance from the lamb of God, and it in turn gives life in abundance.

Abundance of life gives way to fruitfulness. A tree that is all green and loaded with many fruits depicts the abundance of life. The display of the fruits of the Spirit – love, peace, joy, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control is a clear sign of the abundant life in our Saviour. It's hard to find people who showcase all the fruits. That explains the scarcity of abundance in the lives of people who claim to follow Christ. The wisdom of this world has marred the minds of many and made them strike a deal with the world at large to the extent it appears to be the norm. This unconventional erosion of the values of life has become the foundation of thought process in the academic world as well. This in fact, drains the abundance in the posterity, converting everyone to robots who lack the gifts of the Spirit. This is a very grave situation that poses the question – man, where art thou? It becomes highly appropriate at this juncture to lament with William Wordsworth, "What man has made of man?"

Life is the embodiment of love and mercy. The fruits of the Spirit shall help everyone to live in abundance, and the abundance of life promised through the love of Jesus shall guide everyone to the Spirit-filled life. Celebrating this life shall then be a reality. If only this world woke up to that heaven of abundance and fruitfulness! I sincerely wish that this conference helps each one to move one step closer to celebrating life in its abundance and fruitfulness.

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

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




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

Receive Life

Great is the love of God toward us that He offers us life- His own dear Son, Jesus Christ. Jesus saith, "I am ... the life" (John 14:6). We, who are of natural birth and descent, when we receive Him, are born of God (John 1:12, 13); born with new life, the life of Christ. This life will quicken the virtues- faith, hope and love in us, by which we can live a wholesome Christian life: walking by faith, loving God and others and hoping to enter the eternal kingdom of God. Today many a Christian is told to evangelise rather than to show Christ's abundant life and fruitfulness in them. It may be possible to evangelise without faith, but impossible to show Christ. Faith in Jesus Christ and works must go hand in hand. "Faith, if it hath not works, is dead, being alone" (James 2:17). One without the other is dead indeed. "When the Son of Man cometh, shall He find faith on the earth?" (Luke 18:8).

Bear Fruit

Jesus saith, "Abide in me, and I in you. As the branch cannot bear fruit of itself, except it abide in the vine; no more can ye, except ye abide in me. I am the Vine, ye are the branches: He that abideth in me, and I in him, the same bringeth forth much fruit: for without me ye can do nothing" (John 15:4, 5). How shall we abide in Him? We are made branches of the Vine, when baptised in the name of the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit; we must remain in the Vine until we become one with Him; so that faith can grow and mature to bear luscious fruit. Jesus has made it clear that no man can bear fruit on his own. He cursed the fig tree that had no fruit in it; He saw it as one without faith (Mark 11:14, 22). This makes it clear that without faith there can be no fruit.

Once baptised with water, we must look for the fruit of baptism in us, which is the work of the triune God: the Father reconciling us to Himself by drawing us to His Son and regenerating us by the Holy Spirit. It is God who brings us to repentance and faith. Jesus saith, "This is the work of God, that ye believe on Him whom He hath sent" (John 6:29). When God works, He will bring us to perfect belief. Many churches in the west do not baptise children born within Christian households; this deprives them of a covenantal identity with Christ and of the work of God in their lives. The fruit of water baptism is the life of Christ in us; the fruit of His life in us is quickened faith; the fruit of such faith is baptism with the Holy Spirit which seals the covenant. A moment to rejoice!

The evidence of baptism with the Holy Spirit is the appearance of fruit on the branch: the fruit of the Spirit- love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control (Galatians 5:22). These are essences of the one Fruit, which is the Spirit of Christ. "Against such things [the Spirit] there is no law" (v 23). When Jesus returns will He find Fruit?

Celebrate Christ



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Organizational Design: The Need for a Well-Defined Mission

This paper was written for a graduate course titled "Nonprofits, Co-operatives and the Social Economy" at the Ontario Institute for Studies in Education at the University of Toronto.

In the following essay *Church of South India* will be referred to as the overarching structure (religious denomination) and *CSI Church, Toronto* will be used to refer to its affiliate congregation in Toronto.

History of the Organization

The Church of South India began in 1947 with the amalgamation of five congregations—the Anglican, Methodist, Congregational, Presbyterian, and Reformed Churches. Today the organization stands as the largest protestant church in India with four million members and fifteen thousand congregations in the states of Andhra Pradesh, Karnataka, Kerala, and Tamil Nadu (Church of South India, 2010).

CSI Church, Toronto materialized in 1986 as the Malayalee community in the greater Toronto area grew. As more people with ancestral roots from Kerala migrated to Toronto, the number of people who previously held membership with the Church of South India also increased. This prompted the notion that a space for people who shared this particular doctrine was required (as until this point members attended local Anglican churches or other Malayalee congregations of different denominations in Toronto). After 25 years, it now stands as a leader in the Kerala Christian community in Toronto and has established itself as a fully functioning church with multiple ministries (CSI Church, Toronto, 2012).

Primary Services

The church's primary service is to provide worship services in Malayalam using the Church of South India's liturgy (CSI Church, Toronto, 2012). It is a place where those who possess ancestry from Kerala can come and experience religious ceremonies in their ancestral language and celebrate the culture.

However, due to the nature of the organization, it functions as more than a religious organization. Being affiliated with a specific group of immigrants to Canada, the church also works as an integration tool for newcomers. When newcomers contact the church, the church arranges supports for those newcomers by connecting them with other immigrants who have gone through a similar experience of joining Canadian society. Members range from those who recently immigrated to those who immigrated over 40 years ago. With this knowledge, members help newcomers find their place in Canadian society by advising them on things such as how to find work, integrate children in school/extra-curricular activities, and navigate resources (CSI Church, Toronto, 2012).

The organization also functions as a place to preserve ancestral customs. For example, in 2005, the church began a language program to satisfy the request of those wanting to fully participate in services conducted in Malayalam (CSI Church, Toronto, 2012). The program was created to teach those who desired to read, write and speak Malayalam. Participants in the past have ranged from children born in Canada to adults who never learned the language because they lived and/or grew up outside the state of Kerala.

Human and Financial Resources

The church is fully funded by its members and functions as a registered charitable organization with the Canada Revenue Agency. Revenue in its last year amounted to approximately \$150 000 and its expenditures were about \$135 000 (Annual Report, 2012). However, through the daily operations and the annual report one can conclude, like in most non-profits, its greatest asset is not its finances but its members.

The church operates solely on volunteer support with exception to the vicar who is its one paid staff member. Its various committees, programs, and events require numerous hours to execute and it is all accomplished through voluntary support. If the church were to take into account some measures of social accounting, it would see the enormous asset its members were. The choir, for example, made up of approximately 30 members meet for rehearsal and participate in the service for approximately 3 hours a

week. If the organization were to calculate the contributions of the choir at minimum wage over a year it would amount to \$47 970 ($30 \times 3 \times 10.25 \times 52 = 47 970$). This number portrays a conservative amount considering the members of the choir have varying level of expertise and most members put in more hours than stated here; nevertheless, it highlights the significance of volunteer support within the organization. Each ministry within the church require similar levels of commitment by its membership, thus it can be concluded, time stand as the strongest resource of the organization.

Governance

CSI Church, Toronto is governed by a board (which they call the Executive Committee) consisting of 14 members. The board is elected by the members of the congregation once a year at the annual general meeting. They are responsible for overseeing the day to day activities of the church and facilitating and/or coordinating the events throughout the year. Its affiliation with a diocese in Kerala, India, means in addition to the congregation, it is also held accountable to that diocese and to the Moderator (the head of the Church of South India). It is currently in the process of also developing an association agreement with the Anglican Church of Canada, which will mean the church will also have explicit obligations to that body as well.

The board follows a "Results-Based" model where the focus is to create a vision and produce results (Quarter et al., 2009, p. 221). The vicar functions as the head and/or overseer, while the board works to connect the activities of the organization to the community. The board works to set direction, monitor progress, and report results to the general body.

As Quarter et al. state, "[w]hile members may choose not to participate in the governance, they are entitled to and often they exercise this entitlement when they are displeased with decisions undertaken by the organization...Therefore governance in member-focused associations is very challenging in that the board and management must be in tune with members' aspirations, even the aspirations of those members who limit their participation to using the services." (Quarter et al., 2009, p.232)

With a responsibility to the entire collective these representatives work to balance the activities of the church with the desires of all parishioners. The complexity of this task has been evident a few times over the life-span of the organization when members (who seem to be absent) suddenly appear for general meetings to advocate or advance an idea they feel is important or neglected. It is in these moments contradictions between the multiple priorities start to be apparent and the importance of a clear and precise mission for the organization becomes evident.

Organizational Design

"Organizations suffer if their design does not support their mission and strategy" (Armstrong, 2013). This statement emphasizes the importance of developing a clear understanding of the mission as it highlights the way in which design, mission and strategy all work as equally essential components to the success of an organization.

With an ambiguous vision, members perceive what they believe to be most important as the priority of the organization (although it may not be the case). Clarifying the objectives of the organization mitigate some of the issues that arise from misunderstanding and help focus the organization to create solutions in union with the actual desires of its memberships. As stated, with an accurate understanding of the mission, a well-thought out strategy can be constructed to create a design that will build a solid foundation to ensure longevity to the organization.

Perspectives (Multiple Priorities)

As a Christian organization within a predominately non-Christian country that functions as a substantial

contributor to social programming in India, the Church of South India states the commitment of the church as:

"Being the largest Protestant church in India, the CSI celebrates her life with Indian culture and spirituality and she also raises her voice for the voiceless on matters of justice, peace and integrity of creation. Sharing the love of Jesus Christ with the people of India through proclamation of the good news of Jesus; responding to human need through institutional and emergency relief work; through community development projects and skill training programmes for the marginalized and disadvantaged sections of the people and programmes for the integrity of creation." (Church of South India website, 2010)

These priorities of Indian culture, doctrine/theology, and social objectives that the Church of South India uphold are the same goals the CSI Church, Toronto implicitly sets out for itself. However, CSI Church, Toronto has experienced difficulty in reconciling the three goals due to the lack of definition around its mission and priorities.

Although many members feel a sense that all three components are necessary (and do not exclusively prescribe to one) members differ on how they balance the priorities in their mind and such is where varying perspectives emerge. Those who perceive Indian culture to be the priority of the church primarily view the organization as an ethnocultural association and/or social club. Although, they acknowledge the need for activities related to theology and social objectives they often do not place their support behind activities that place more emphasis on doctrine or social objectives outside the Indian community.

On the contrary, those who believe theology is at the core of the organization sometimes fail to see the need for cultural and/or social activities. These members believe the spiritual experience of the individual is priority and therefore consider the main goal of the organization to nurture that experience within the members and others outside of the organization as well. Following this trail, many who believe this to be the most important, try to bring in practices from denominations that place great importance on evangelical doctrine.

Thirdly, those who deem social objectives to be at the core of the church's practice once again find it difficult to see the need for excessive Indian cultural and/or theological pursuits. They believe the organization can achieve its goals within its current theological frame and should focus its efforts on developing a social consciousness amongst its members and participating in community development initiatives instead.

The lack of delineation around these priorities and the way in which they should interact have begun to show considerable signs of stagnation and stress within the organization. In its 25th year, the organization underwent a significant adjustment as many of its members left due to a difference of opinion in priorities. The exodus of that membership group naturally redefined certain objectives of the organization and consequently ignited commentary and/or discussion amongst members and leadership regarding the objectives of the association. Nevertheless, a formal in-depth and detailed conversation around the mission and its vision is still yet to occur. If the institution would like to move forward and grow in any profound way it must, as Armstrong stated, develop a mission so that its organizational design can match its mission and strategy (Armstrong, 2013).

The Board (The Election Process)

"When designing the right kind of board, member-focused associations need 'to face the challenge of the integration of values with value, and vice versa" (Quarter et al., 2009, p. 231; Mal and Vézina, 2004, p. 132). If the board must incorporate the values of the organization, the organization must find candidates who respect the values of the organization and possess the skill set to realize the mission. The selection of board members, thus, stands to be a vital component in the strategy of the association.

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The selection process of its board is one area CSI Church, Toronto's procedure fails to meet its potential in design. As mentioned earlier, the members of the board are elected at the annual general meeting and nominations for the positions are allowed to be submitted up to two weeks before the annual meeting. On occasion, nominations will be submitted prior to the meeting, however, most often nominations are taken from the floor.

When nominations are taken from floor, implicitly and/or explicitly, preferential treatment is given to certain voices over others. Those who feel more comfortable in the space tend to be more vocal in meetings and consequently able to further their agendas more easily. With the climate being such that most people feel embarrassed to express their interest in taking up a position, most people wait to be nominated by others. The culture of the organization in conjunction with dominant voices, therefore, makes it difficult to ensure those who are passionate about the mission and those with new perspectives enter the arena.

If the three "Key Success Factors" of a good board are as Armstrong states—"the board must shape direction for the non-profit through its vision, mission, strategy and policies; ensure that leadership, resources and finances support mission; [and] monitor performance and take corrective action promptly (Armstrong, 2013)—the selection of board members should be one that is given considerable attention bearing in mind the grave responsibility they assume.

Current board structure allocates six positions to represent specific populations within the association. Those elected to these positions are expected to be the group's voice in the church's decision making process, as well as, plan, co-ordinate and manage activities for their respected group. By selecting a person at random at the meeting, groups cannot ensure a person that shares the vision and/or possesses the skill set to fulfil its mission is elected.

Last minute nominations from the floor pose multiple problems. A rash election cannot ensure an equitable and balanced representation of the body is elected. As Quarter et al. state, "an organization's design choice that is out of sync with its environment, its mission, and its strategy will make it difficult to be effective. As well it is important to distinguish between *effectiveness* and *efficiency....*[e]ffectiveness means 'doing the right thing,' while efficiency means 'doing things right'" (Quarter et al., 2009, p.218). While choosing a board in such a manner may mean an efficient board is elected it does not necessarily mean an effective one is.

Conclusion

As an organization with a congenial history and robust set of resources this organization has the potential to be a unique agent in Canada's social economy. However, in order to become an organization that is profound in the landscape it wishes to affect, it must meticulously examine and scrutinize its purpose, establish a clear cut mission, and generate a vision for the future. It must remove ambiguity to help focus its actions and allow for greater transparency in its operations. At the moment, the church is at a loss of what its vision is for the future other than to be in existence. It must change this by realizing why and how it should exist so it can fine-tune, regulate and correct its process if it would like to ensure longevity and meaning in its life span.

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EVANGELISM — GOD'S IDEA

Evangelism began with Jesus and continued with His disciples. The Bible tells us in Mt.9:36 that, "when Jesus saw the multitudes He was moved with compassion because they were weary and were scattered like sheep having no Shepherd." Then He said to them, "The harvest is plentiful, but the laborers are few. Therefore, pray to the Lord of the harvest to send out laborers into the harvest." (Mt.9:37-38). Then He sent the twelve disciples into the harvest; He gave them power over unclean spirits, to cast them out, and to heal all kinds of sick-



ness and...disease." (Mt.10:1). He instructed them to go into the 'neighborhood', to the lost sheep of the house of Israel. (Mt.10:16). He directed them to preach that "The kingdom of heaven is at hand". They were told not to take heavy bags or money. Jesus also assured them that what they needed to speak will be given to them, "...for it is not you who speak, but the Spirit of your Father who speaks in you." (Mt.10:19-20). There are many truths in the above instructions which we need to follow for effective evangelism.

- It was to the believers of the time that Jesus gave the instructions.
- They were not to neglect their own people, the house of Israel.
- They were to preach (warn them) that "the Kingdom of Heaven is at hand."
- They were not to carry heavy bags or extra items, ('which may make them tired'),
- They were endowed with power and were assured of the presence of the Father, and the message they were to speak.

How do these apply to the ministry of Evangelism today?

Firstly, **God calls all the believers of today** to follow the command of Jesus. (Mt.28:19). "Go…and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all things that I have commanded you…" Then He promised, "Lo I am with you always, to the end of the age." Evangelism is not to be stagnant, but moving to all generations. In today's world we see many Evangelists carrying the torch and delivering the message of the gospel. I believe Christ's heart grieves over the 'lost sheep' of this world. He fulfilled the plan of Redemption, but who will declare Him and His love which took Him to the cross of Calvary? Who will give the rest of the world an opportunity to know Him and be redeemed by Him to spend eternity with the Shepherd.

Why the believers are called?

- The believers have Christ in their hearts and the power of the Holy Spirit who resides in them, who guides, teaches, convicts sinners and converts their souls.
- The believers have the tools they need such as,

MY CALLING. In 1987 I was called by God to do evangelism in my neighborhood. I had no know-how then, but I was willing. Four years later, my husband, Philip, also joined me and we began an outreach ministry in Toronto in 1992 which spread to other cities. Today, after 30 years we are still fulfilling God's command in sharing the faith. After a few years God gave us another Word, "You shall still bear fruit in your old age." (Psalm 92:14). This is what God is doing with us now.

Recently, we had the privilege of doing Evangelism Training for two groups at New Jersey and New York. It was indeed powerful and fruitful. Many among the groups have already begun the journey in evangelism. Two to three years ago we began an Evangelism Outreach Ministry at the CSI church in Toronto where we attend. It was the result of the prayers of a few dedicated and motivated women of the church who were zealous to share the gospel. We had the support of the Leadership of the church and inspiration from an Evangelist, Anson Thomas. Philip and I gave the training, we as a group spent time in prayer and on the few occasions we stepped out, we witnessed 40 salvations in two summers. In the winter we focused on prayer for the unsaved and for the outreach ministry. Prayer of agreement among believers moves the hand and heart of God to do miracles. Make prayer a focus to witness miracles of salvation.

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









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MAY I BOAST IN NOTHING BUT THE CROSS...... Galatians 6:14


It so happens in life that we blame GOD the whole while when we go through tragic times but we tend to 'Thank HIM' less when we so abound with blessings seen and unseen!

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
Life in its Abundance and Fruitfulness of a Cut Down Tree

Fruits and fruitfulness is a concept connected to tree, that too a living tree. This year for our conference, we have chosen to meditate upon the title 'Celebrating LIFE in its Abundance and Fruitfulness' in a devotional context. (John 10:10 & Galatians 5:22,23)

While I am writing this devotional article as on May 18, 2017 I am serving as Vicar of Immanuel CSI Church in Elizabeth, NJ. I started to help this congregation from first of January this year after having completed nearly 9 months of service with Hudson Valley CSI Congregation. My entry as vicar in CSI Churches started with the death of a pioneer of Christ CSI Church, Tappan, NY. Last three weeks in a row we in our Elizabeth CSI Church had to acknowledge the death of the extended family members of our congregants. It is at this juncture I was asked by the 2017 CSI Conference Souvenir Committee Convener Mr. Joy Chemmanoor through our Church Secretary Mr. Mathew Cherian to contribute an article. After having meditated the theme for a week in the context of the current Church Ministry, I am led by the Lord to write this devotional article "Life in its Abundance and Fruitfulness of a Cut Down Tree".

All our lives are cut down trees and what we have and who we are today is the sprouts on the cut down trees. I invite you to read the article till the end as the Lord has a word of hope for you, no matter whatever may be your life situation. Please read it carefully and identify that particular word of hope meant for you in your life context.

Created Tree

Having tree as an image for life, all our life is created by God for a purpose without doubt, as the tree is created to bear fruit. God prophesied through Isaiah

"everyone who is called by my name, whom I created for my glory, whom I formed and made." (Isaiah 43:7).

The purpose is ultimately to bring glory to God though our life. God will use His called people and chosen people and lift them up high so that He will get the glory. There is a relationship established in this purpose, and in this mutual relationship we give the glory to God and He receives the glory and further enables us to go higher. Since God created the man in His image (Genesis 1:26) we cannot fulfill the purpose of God in our life without God in our life. Creator of our life has power over it and His say is final unless we willfully disobey the voice of God speaking through our own inner man.

I realized the purpose of God in my life at the train track at the age of 14 when I was about to commit suicide. God miraculously touched me and brought me out of the then experience of tree cut-off. Since then I experience the joy of salvation and peace of God in my life. I sense a driving force to do something or other for God and for His Church, His people in most creative ways. Life is led by an inspiration and vision towards accomplishment of a particular mission. God likes us to fruitful (John 15:1-16) is only as we bear fruit that the Lord is glorified (v.8).

Cut Down Tree

Every human being life after Adam and eve is the image of the cut down tree. The experience of being cut down in life is having to come to a hopeless situation and dead end in life issues. The suicide rate among the younger generation is alarmingly increasing around the world. This is simply because of the original man disobeyed God,

"but you must not eat from the tree of the knowledge of good and evil, for when you eat from it you will certainly die." (Genesis 2:17).

As you read this article where are you in your life, what is your hope and what is the source of hope. Job in the old testament had a different experience in the light of his faith and in the midst of such losses. If you are in such a situation of hopelessness regarding health, finance, relationships, marriage, future, jobs

etc, the terminated process of life, cut off tree will sprout again. (Job 14:7). Because, Job says

"Yet through the scent of water it will bud, and bring forth boughs like a plant" (Job 14:9). When Jesus says "The ax is already at the root of the trees, and every tree that does not produce good fruit will be cut down and thrown into the fire" (Mathew 3:10)

He is referring to later punishment as Job says, not to truly cut the tree that the human die here prematurely.

"For the earth will be filled with the knowledge of the glory of the LORD as the waters cover the sea". (Habakkuk 2:14).

The scent of water is the knowledge that Lord Jesus is the Savior and will Redeem His Children.

I was invited to USA in the year 2008 by a non-Bible believing Seminary to do my Masters and Doctorate but its administrators once after my masters employed me and used me to recruit my contacts out of my influence and then deceived me and my family. Our second son was 40 days old when we were laid off without proper INS records. It was a total cut off experience. Our insurance and income was cut off. The Seminary did not maintain the records with labor and INS departments. We had to look at some food pantry for survival. But as I am writing this article we have confirmed our partnership with another evangelical seminary to start a Christ centered theological seminary called InterChristian Theological Seminary. This is nothing but the cut down tree is sprouting again.

Consecrated Tree

All this is because the tree called Jesus was cut off on my behalf us according to the prophecy of Isaiah.

> "For he was cut off from the land of the living; for the transgression of my people he was punished". (Isiah 53:8)

Your hope in Christ will not be in vain because "He himself bore our sins" in his body on the cross, so that we might die to sins and live for righteousness; "by his wounds you have been healed" (I Peter 2:24). Lord Jesus consecrated His life and gave His life for our sins on the cross. "And if Christ has not been raised, our preaching is useless and so is your faith". (I Corinthians 15:14). By giving His life to us He restores the original plan of God's creation to be fruitful.

Continuing Tree

So the hope is renewed and the purpose of God is reinforced, the life continues by Grace that Lord Jesus gives having it earned on the cross and we experience it by faith.

> "Grace and peace be yours in abundance through the knowledge of God and of Jesus our Lord. His divine power has given us everything we need for a godly life through our knowledge of him who called us by his own glory and goodness. (2 Peter 1:2-3).

We are invited to experience the grace and live a godly life as Peter says. May God's grace be abundance in your life particularly in the area of your need, weakness and sickness. May there be breakthrough for you as there be sprout in the cut off tree. This is the life that Jesus talks about in John 10:10

Celebrating Tree

When the cut off tree gets life again, this means Lord Jesus takes over our life in its entirety in His hand and creates us again to do the good work for the people around us. The true Christian life is a recreated life by Jesus Christ.

> "For we are his workmanship, created in Christ Jesus unto good works, which God hath before ordained that we should walk in them". Ephesians 2:10 (KJV).

What was kept in store by God when He created the mankind originally is restored to the believers of our Lord Jesus Christ. Do you believe that Lord Jesus Christ has forgiven you and has given you a new life? If so, it is time to involve in the ministry of the Church and mission of the World. We are given gifts and talents to be fruitful, useful reflecting godly character.

Job says in Job 12:10 "In his hand is the life of every creature and the breath of all mankind". So we are admonished by Job to handover all our life affairs and efforts in His hand that He will bless us double portion as He did for Job "the Lord gave Job twice as much as he had before" Job 42:10. May the Lord continue to bless you, your family and congregation in a special way during this conference and beyond.


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




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My Uppy

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
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GOD's WORD AND ANATOMY

HANDS







Ever wondered why it is important to hear the voice of God? Why does the scripture ask us to be still and know Him? What would His voice sound like? Will it be a mystery forever? Would it be like the voice of the thunder or would it be the calm in the stillness of the night? Would it be heard in the rustling of the leaves in the wind or would it be in the waves crashing at the ocean side?

I didn't get an answer to these questions over night. I constantly pondered and meditated over several scriptures on how I could recognise the voice of God and why it is so important to hear and recognise His voice. I believe if the great and mighty men of God heard His voice and obeyed it, how much more I? In addition to being obedient to His word and the scriptures, there is another key factor which I thought is worth mentioning.

John 10:2-6 says...

But he who enters by the door is the shepherd of the sheep. To him the doorkeeper opens, and the sheep hear his voice; and he calls his own sheep by name and leads them out. And when he brings out his own sheep, he goes before them; and the sheep follow him, for they know his voice. Yet they will by no means follow a stranger, but will flee from him, for they do not know the voice of strangers." Jesus used this illustration, but they did not understand the things which He spoke to them. Christ clearly sets an example of sheep hearing the voice of its shepherd. A lowly animal like the sheep hears its name being called and recognises its Master and trusts Him enough to follow Him. Whether its destiny is to the green pastures, the shearing shed or the slaughter home, they quietly follow Him in faith without doubting or questioning. Our life on the earth can be full of trials and tribulations which makes it necessary for us to be faithful to our Master till the very end.

On that glorious day, when the trumpets shall sound and when Christ returns to take us home, to the place He promised, where He has prepared several rooms. On that victorious day, He will call us by our name. What a shame if we wont be able to recognise His voice and the name He calls us by. On hearing that voice we must be able to shrug off our earthly bodies so that our souls would ascend to spend eternity with Him.

Just like any other relationship, the depth of our relationship with the Father will determine our recognition of His voice in our life. The more time you spend with Him, the more you hear His voice and you begin to realise who He is in your life. But sadly the converse is also true, as we detach ourselves from Him, His voice becomes distant and withdrawn with each passing day until one day we neither hear it nor recognise it at all.

Let us not then display ignorance, because ignorance has a price to pay. And it may prove costly, as costly as our souls for which Christ shed his blood and died. For the scriptures say what profit is it if a man gains the whole world but loses his soul?





Shall we then take time to be holy, to spend time in His presence, hear His voice and recognise it at the final trumpet call!


1Thess 4:16-17

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


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

mine believes that he would get the best parking spot even in the worst parking lots where normally one has to wait for a long time. But he claims that any time he approaches a parking lot, a spot would miraculously appear before him. I tried that a few times myself and sometimes, you get scared by the result. You can try that yourself but you should not be a wee bit doubtful.

A sports celebrity once said that that the words from the bible gave him extra energy at a time when he was so tired and almost defeated. Then he said these words aloud in faith. "But those who wait on the LORD, Shall renew their strength; They shall mount up with wings like eagles, They shall run and not be weary, They shall walk and not faint.". (Isaiah 40:31). He renewed his vigor and confidence immediately and won the game. The secret lies in the fact that when you say these words, you need to blindly believe it and then it becomes a reality soon.

Therefore I tell you, whatever you ask for in prayer, believe that you have received it, and it will be yours. (Mark 11:24). Visualize that you received something and its yours. Visualization has a key role in the manifestation of things. Bible says "Finally, brethren, whatsoever things are true, whatsoever things are honest, whatsoever things are just, whatsoever things are pure, whatsoever things are lovely, whatsoever things are of good report; if there be any virtue, and if there be any praise, think on these things." (Philippians 4:8). When you think of something, we often visualize it. So visualize positive things of beauty, of purity and of lovely nature so that you get those things of beauty and purity. In the words of the great philosopher Ralph Waldo Emerson: Man is what he thinks all day long. It is quite true.

When you believe, believe only in positive results. Fear is a big enemy to all positive results. If you fear something strongly, it may happen to you and therefore, believe strongly in God and good endings. "For the thing which I greatly feared is come upon me, and that which I was afraid of is come unto me. (Job 3:25). A classic example can be seen in our common life. It happens to students who fear a lot about examinations. Though they are well prepared, just because they are scared of exams, they forget everything at the time of exam but soon afterwards regains everything in memory.

There are people who believe that bible teachings are only good for the spiritual life. They think that when you need healings, or when you need financial help, or when you need help with anything related to our day to day life, you cannot expect any help from God. Probably they might not have read the story of Jabez. "Jabez cried out to the God of Israel, "Oh, that you would bless me and enlarge my territory! Let your hand be with me, and keep me from harm so that I will be free from pain." And God granted his request. These people again prove that the Bible is right because bible says "According to your faith be it unto you." (Mathew 9:29). If you believe that, then that is what you going to get. If you believe God will provide you, then, you will receive it for sure. So believe in yourself, believe in God and believe in all good things, and then your life will be changed for the best.

Ruth's Defining Moment

The story of Ruth begins with a famine in Israel. An Israelite named Elimelech and his wife Naomi decided to journey with their two sons to the country of Moab, where living there was better and food was plentiful. The two sons married Moabite women. Then tragically, first the husband and then Naomi's sons died. She was left with only her daughter-in-laws, both Moabite women, Orpah and Ruth.

The two women loved Naomi dearly. When Naomi told them she was returning to Israel, they both wanted to follow her. Naomi discouraged them, explaining their prospects of remarriage would be bleak in Israel. The choice to return to their Moabite family, gods, and culture was the defining moment for Orpah and Ruth. Orpah decided to return home, but Ruth decided to accompany Naomi to Israel, a foreign land to her. This was to become her defining moment. Before Ruth made her life changing decision, she must have witnessed a depth of faith in Naomi's God and a strength that was missing from her own life and the lives around her. She possibly also was looking for it.

Ruth said," Do not urge me to leave you or turn back from following you: for where you go I will go, and where you lodge, I will lodge, your people shall be my people and your God, my God. Where you die, I will die and there I will be buried. Thus may the Lord do to me and worse if anything but death parts you and me". (Ruth 1: 16-17)

These are the two most famous and beautiful verses in all of the Scripture. This statement of Ruth contains an amazing confession of love and faith. Israel was not Ruth's country. It was not as fertile and productive as Moab, and had no security and family except for an aging widow and her relatives with very little love expected from Israelites.

Did she make a bad choice? When we live in the world of materialism, where money, popularity and power are the power of the reigning gods, how does it compare with what we see in a sacrificial life lived for God?

Ruth understood that she was faced with the question Jesus would later ask," For what does it profit a man to gain the whole world and forfeit his soul? For what shall a man give in exchange for his soul?" (Mark 8:36-37)

Some of the most admirable people are those who lived simpler life styles. The God of Naomi was a personal God who desired a personal relationship with Ruth. His will, character and purposes had been revealed and they were holy and righteous. He was the only God of Hebrews and even for Moabites. Ruth chose this Hebrew woman and her God, in spite of Naomi being poor. Ruth saw an unshakeable faith in Naomi and in her God.

The Bible is full of defining moments both good and bad. Real people in real life situations just like us. From their examples, we can learn how to prepare for our own defining moments.

Are you nearing a fork in the road, a point where you will be forced make a no-turning back decision? Here are 4 lessons to help you prepare for it:

- •Be Sure to look beneath the superficial. All that glitters is not gold
- •Be willing to trade creature comforts for a higher purpose.
- Choose the right role models in life to mirror in your own.

The 500th Anniversary of the Reformation: Justification by Faith

Martin Luther, who began the Protestant Reformation in 1517, once said "Justification is the article upon which the Church stands or falls." As heirs to the Reformation—in its Anglican, Presbyterian, Congregationalist, and Wesleyan streams—the second-generation of the Church of South India in America must understand what Luther meant, and how it can fuel the ecumenism and mission of the C.S.I. in 21st century America.

"Justification" is an idea rooted in the Old Testament: It is God's declaration that someone is in right relationship with Him. In the Old Testament, God chose the nation of Israel to be his vessels of salvation for the world, and gave them the Law so that they would remain "justified," or righteous in His sight.

By the 1st century AD, the Jews were the faithful remnant of Israel who believed that deliverance for the world would come through them. The Law continued to be obeyed, as the means by which the Jewish people demarcated who was inside God's family, to be used for His holy purposes, and who was outside His family.

However, the New Testament church proclaimed that Jesus Christ is the Jewish Messiah who unexpectedly fulfilled all of God's promises and established God's Kingdom by dying and rising again. The Gospel is the apostolic announcement that the crucified and risen Jesus Christ is king of the world, and that all who turn to Him will be delivered from destruction.

Accordingly, anyone who submits to Jesus' Lordship—regardless of caste, color, or ethnic tribe—will be joined to Him and inherit His rule, glory, and mission. This would fulfill the words of Isaiah 56:6-7, "My house shall be called a house of prayer for all peoples." This raises a question though: What does this mean for Israel and the Law?

In Galatians 3:18, Paul answers this question by referring to Abraham as someone who was declared righteous by faith, because he trusted in God's promise that all nations would be blessed through him and his offspring. Paul is careful to say this was God's purpose all along: To have a people who related to Him on the basis of faith and trust, not by keeping the Law.

So why have the Law at all? Paul in Galatians 3:19-29 very tightly packs the following argument—

The promise to Abraham came long before the Law was given to Israel at Sinai.

God always intended the Law to play a role as a temporary guardian.

As such, the Law had both a negative and positive role.

The negative role was to highlight and magnify Israel's sin, showing that even a holy people set apart for God would fail to serve His purposes without new hearts.

This does not make the Law evil-the Law is good!-but it had the effect of clearly showing that Israel was guilty and worthy of condemnation, just like every other people.

The positive role of the Law was to be a moral tutor which, despite Israel's sin, kept together a faithful remnant until it could be whittled down to Abraham's Seed, Jesus Christ.

Jesus fulfilled the Law in His life, work, and person. He was the faithful Israelite who truly loved God and neighbor.

Jesus died to take the curse of Israel's failure on to Himself, and He is free from the hold of sin, death, and the devil.

Anyone who holds on to the faithfulness of Jesus has "clothed themselves with Christ."

Because we are now found in Jesus, we become heirs to the promise of Abraham-the multi-ethnic people of God through whom God is repairing the world.

Paul wrote the letter to the Galatians because certain Jewish Christians were teaching that new ethnic groups that converted to Christianity must follow the Law, including male circumcision. To Paul, this would contradict the Gospel—it would make it seem like Jesus didn't fulfill God's promise or deal with our sins. In turn, this would constrain the new freedom given to us in Jesus' Spirit, and would limit the inheritance of God's promise to one ethnicity.

This is why Paul was so angry at Peter's hypocrisy in Antioch in Galatians 2:

But when Cephas came to Antioch, I opposed him to his face, because he stood self-condemned; for until certain people came from James, he used to eat with the Gentiles. But after they came, he drew back and kept himself separate for fear of the circumcision faction. And the other Jews joined him in this hypocrisy, so that even Barnabas was led astray by their hypocrisy. But when I saw that they were not acting consistently with the truth of the gospel, I said to Cephas before them all, "If you, though a Jew, live like a Gentile and not like a Jew, how can you compel the Gentiles to live like Jews?"

"We who are Jews by birth and not sinful Gentiles know that a person is not justified by the works of the law, but by faith in Jesus Christ. So we, too, have put our faith in Christ Jesus that we may be justified by faith in Christ and not by the works of the law, because by the works of the law no one will be justified.

"But if, in seeking to be justified in Christ, we Jews find ourselves also among the sinners, doesn't that mean that Christ promotes sin? Absolutely not! If I rebuild what I destroyed, then I really would be a lawbreaker.

"For through the law I died to the law so that I might live for God. I have been crucified with Christ and I no longer live, but Christ lives in me. The life I now live in the body, I live by faith in the Son of God, who loved me and gave himself for me. I do not set aside the grace of God, for if righteousness could be gained through the law, Christ died for nothing!"

Paul is convinced that no one can be declared righteous by keeping the Law; the story of Israel itself shows that. Instead, the only way to be declared righteous is on the basis of the work and person of Jesus.

As he says, "I have been crucified with Christ and I no longer live, but Christ lives in me." In Romans 6:3 -4 he says much the same thing, "Or don't you know that all of us who were baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized in his death? We were therefore buried with him through baptism in to death in order that, just as Christ was raised from the dead through the glory of the Father, we too may live a new life."

At the heart of Paul's Gospel is this idea: That when people trust in Jesus, what is true of Him becomes true of them. His death becomes their death, and His resurrection and new life becomes their resurrection and new life. Paul is clear that we belong to Jesus' New Covenant family, not because we keep the Law, but because Christ has died and risen for us, and because we have been united to Him.

This has huge implications for 1) who can be included in God's family, and 2) what it means to live as God's family.

First, an understanding of justification by faith should humble us and open our hearts to friends and neighbors from different backgrounds. Our cosmic worth is not based on our bank accounts, credit

scores, Facebook likes, school grades, or career success. It is based solely on the faithfulness of the Messiah, who loved us and gave Himself for us. In Christ, we are already loved, and we inherit a beautiful weight of glory.

Because our justification is based on Christ's work, not on ourselves, we have no cause to look down upon anyone else. Whether they are male or female; whether they are Pentecostal, Baptist, Orthodox, or Catholic; whether they are Black, White, East Asian, South Asian, or Latino; whether they are rich or poor; whether they are wise or fools; no matter what sins anyone is struggling with—there is nothing within us, of our own power, that makes us superior. We have been justified by Christ's faithfulness, and so we can reach out in freedom to love our neighbors with a truly ecumenical spirit. This is at the heart of the C.S.I. story.

Second, we must understand that understanding justification by faith means that we are also given Christ' Spirit. Christ gave Himself up for us out of love for us. What does it mean to have His Spirit? It means that we must give ourselves up out of love for our neighbors.

Paul points in this direction in Galatians 5:13-14, when he writes:

You, my brothers and sisters, were called to be free. But do not use your freedom to indulge the flesh; rather, serve one another humbly in love. For the entire law is fulfilled in keeping this one command: "Love your neighbor as yourself."

The Law is good-the command to love God with our entire being, and to love our neighbor as ourselves, is good. But the Law did not give in itself the power to obey the Law. Our flesh desires our own security, advancement, and status, and these desires are in conflict with the Law.

The Good News is not only that Jesus fulfilled the Law on our behalf, but that He lives in us through the Spirit. This forms us into a new kind of human being—one able to properly image God in the world again. And this God is a God who pours out His Love, at sacrificial cost and pain to himself. This must be our mission in North America, as heirs of the Reformation.

Examine your ways

In today's fast paced life, do we ever have time to examine ourselves?

The Bible clearly says 'Be still and know that I am God'...Psalm 46:10

By being still, we are forced to reflect on the meaning of our actions and reflect rather than react. If practiced and repeated regularly, it allows us to be aware of our God and also be self aware.

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
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

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the people of India for His redemptive work and to demonstrate accessibility to the Kingdom of God. The gigantic task of the church demands corporate action with regard to the needy situations of India, especially in alleviating the moral, physical and political decay of the Indian society. William Carey, 'the Father of modern missions' and 'the author of the second Reformation,' maintained that the blind and superstitious beliefs, polygamy, child marriage, the burning of widows, the exposure of the sick and the old to cruel conditions, the burning of lepers, and the throwing of children to the holy rivers to please gods and goddesses were to be rectified by the antidote of the gospel. Missiologists like J. Verkuyl hold the view that Carey was the cornerstone of modern missiology;6 the Serampore mission is a model for the entire world for His redemptive work on this planet. The recapture of Carey's vision has to be maintained for the triumph of the gospel of Christ in India. The church's task in the Indian sub-continent is a herculean one because of the intense and complex problems confronted by contemporary Indian society. The pluralistic situation of India demands the active presence of the church in every sphere of its realm in the Indian sub-continent. The dual approach of the church is significant because both salvation and humanization are interrelated in the redemptive work of God in the Indian situation.

The C.S.I. is an emblem of the Suffering Servant -- Messiah

The church in independent India carries the mantle of the crucified Christ as a reconciling tool between God and fallen man in the Indian situation. The suffering Servant of God – Messiah, volunteered Himself for the deliverance of fallen humanity; similarly, the C.S.I. has to be God's suffering arm in the multiethnic and multi-religious milieu of the Indian situation. The suffering mission of the church can bring investment in the Kingdom of God; the suffering church can bring rejuvenation and hope for the Indian society. The church's suffering is a compensation paid for the fallen world; the suffering of the church can bring hope and victory. The cross of Christ still inspires the faithful; there is no crown without the cross. The church is still the hope for the needy world – the down-trodden, the weak, socially depressed, the marginalised, the tribals and so on. In any situation, the dignity of an individual is very important; the C.S.I. should monitor its missionary strategy in this regard. The C.S.I. should explore new avenues to the slum dwellers, homeless, tribals, unemployed, Adivasis, Harijans, orphans and to people at the verge of devastation and misery and marginal situation; the church has to become the voice of the voiceless. The C.S.I. look for new 'Mother Theresas' to search for the unwanted and the destitute, even in the midst of so many forms of social evils.

The exodus of the people from rural to urban areas reminds us the oversight and responsibilities of the church in the new situations. Since the mobility of population is unpredictable, the Dioceses should encourage and find provision for worshipping places for the linguistic groups or other itinerary groups within the boundary of the Diocese; an atmosphere of mutual understanding should be explored. The population explosion in India has vital needs in cities and towns and the C.S.I. can explore new avenues to serve India with its needy situations in an admirable way. As we have seen earlier, the population explosion in India gives rise to the many grave concerns that the nation cannot support or nurture its alarming population explosion. The eradication of illiteracy, primary health concerns, nutritional problems, tribal and caste problems should be addressed and efforts should be made to alleviate the sufferings of human beings. Christian institutions can still play an exemplary role as models in the secular world to serve God and the nation in a broad perspective. Monoethnic and/or monolinguistic situations have been changed in the cities of India and this reality is very significant in south India.

The C.S.I. the light and the salt of the world

Jesus Christ in His earthly ministry coined these two metaphors to signify the role of His disciples or lis-

teners; at present the C.S.I. has the same parallelism in executing its role to the wider world around it. In the annals of history the church's presence has brought light and hope to the dark situations of the world around it since Jesus said, "I am the light of the world" (St. Jn.

8:12). The Church is a mirror which reflects the light of Jesus to the darkened areas of this planet; that light has to be continuously reflected. Similarly, pointing to the disciples Jesus said,

You are the salt of the world' (Matt.5:13). This metaphor tells the preserving quality of the principles of the Christian faith; again, because of the leavening phenomenon of the salt it is keeping things from impurity and decay. The destructive effect of the materialistic world cannot spoil the whole matter. A little leaven leavens the whole lump (Gal.5:9); this can be compared with the work of the Christian community around it. Christian education should be popularized at all levels of the C.S.I. since the Bible is the primary guide for anybody's spiritual growth; the knowledge of the Bible should be popularized in the total life of the C.S.I.

The C.S.I. as the watchman for South India

The C.S.I. has been endowed with immense power to serve the people of India; it is a called-out community to serve the multiethnic milieu of South India - it should sense the pulse of Indian society and should carry on its mission strategies for the advancement of the gospel. Vast mission fields, innumerable institutions as vehicles permeate the gospel, unlimited openings for service, western missionary links, trained manpower are coincided with the mission of the C.S.I. in the long run. The C.S.I. should reach the unreached spots of South India which is her God- given treasure to gear its missionary outreach to evolve its missionary strategy for the future. The C.S.I. can generate immense power to serve the people of India. The transfer of power to the nationals since its inauguration also reminds the responsibilities of the members of the church. The C.S.I. is the watchman (cf. Gen.4:9; Ezek, 3:17ff, 33:7ff) for South India; the institutions of the C.S.I. are an arm of God to the wider world in which it has been called to serve. The relevance of the church's presence is more unavoidable in all realms of the Indian society than in any other situation because it always tries to answer the question, "Where is your brother?" The demand for Christian missions and services is more crucial in the present time than any other decade when India is concerned with its complex problems. The presence of the mission of Jesus ignites and radiates others; so the relevance of the gospel brings hope and harmony to the areas where sporadic or volatile situations exist.

The mission of the C.S.I. in the new millennium

The church has to face the new millennium with a new message of Christ to face its challenges. Since the church mirrors the divine plan of God, it cannot be idle in the Indian society when political and social changes are taking place at a rapid rate. According to statistics, one fifth of the global population is in India, (again nearly eighty percent of the world's population is in South East Asia); this recalls the spiritual, material or physical needs of the Indian society. The church in India should have its koinonia (fellowship) to fulfill its diakonia (service) when it is commissioned to execute its high calling when the church is the servant of the Lord Jesus Christ. Mr. A. B. Vajpai, the former Prime Minister of India, announced that 2000 A.D. is the year of the Lord Jesus Christ. What are the contributions and the new resolutions of the Christian community to serve the people of India? Let the C.S.I. look to Jesus, listen to His voice, do His will as we have surpassed the 69 years and confront the new millennium to fulfill the meaning of true discipleship and to fulfill the slogan 'the church as the servant of the Lord Jesus Christ.'

St. Thomas, one of the disciples of Jesus Christ, volunteered himself to take the good news to that Hin-

du country; this reflects obedience and commitment. History reveals that St. Thomas Christians were not a missionary or propagating community; they had not shown any genuine interest to demonstrate the mystery of the gospel in the previous centuries. The entry of western missionary societies to the Indian soil was not because of the compulsion from India; their advent to the Indian subcontinent is a symbol of sacrifice and thus to impart the love of Jesus to others. The C.S.I. is a pilgrim church7 where the pilgrimage is not yet complete. The unity within the C.S.I. should be explored further. Mark Gibbard, a member of the Order of St. John the Evangelist, England, stated in the mid-sixties, 'Unity Is Not Enough.' The chronology of the C.S.I. has turned seven decades since its inauguration; mobilizing of all the Diocese and all of its departments, the C.S.I. should prove its dynamism to the land and to the people which is called to serve because it is an obligation with regard to India. Let the C.S.I. continue this commitment and obedience. At present that paradigm is still recalling our Christian responsibilities to India. The C.S.I. has been commissioned to serve the people of this vast mission field; the existence of the C.S.I. has been to acknowledge and to impart His eternal purpose to the people of India. The Church in India cannot be a bystander but it should be a participant to reflect God's agape (unconditional love) in the new millennium. The Christian church should evolve its own timetable in the new millennium.

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
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
