



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Editorial

Choosing to be Joyful!

Is happiness our natural human state? This is an interesting and also much debated question with arguments split on both sides. Based on statics of mental health and suicide it would seem that happiness is not our natural state. But rather than argue either way, the pertinent question to ask is what our disposition *should* be as Christians.

It is interesting that the Bible subtly distinguishes between happiness and joy, and regards joy as being greater as it is promised to us by God for eternity. Happiness is a fleeting earthly emotion that we do not experience constantly, and it is also easily replaced by other emotions like anger, sadness, and frustration. So, in essence we are influenced by the conditions around us to feel happy or unhappy. Whereas joy is a more stable and lasting state of mind which stems from being consciously rooted in God's purpose for our lives. A good reference is the text in Hebrews 12:2 where it says about Jesus that, "...For the joy set before Him, He endured the cross...." To think that anyone would want to endure a crucifixion for the promise of eternal joy is not easy to understand, and yet that is the example that Jesus left us. Jesus was clear about this and John 15:11 proves it, "These things I have spoken to you so that my joy may be in you, and that your joy may be made full".

So why does Jesus want us to have 'His joy' rather than our happiness? I believe it is to inspire us to focus on Him and His promise of eternal life for us because everything that the world offers is transient and sure to disappoint. If we look closely into the lives of the apostles and other key Bible figures, we see a pattern; in that they lived their lives on earth physically but with a mindset set on the joy of eternity. As people though, we are always looking for things that make us happy, and we make life decisions guided by what we think will guarantee us happiness. The mantra of the times is to live unfettered and as we "feel" rather than as we ought to. True Christian living challenges this approach, and our call is to face struggles in our daily life in faith, enduring it all in the joy of Christ.

As we cross into the month of November and the days darken and shorten, if we find ourselves feeling low, isolated, or experiencing struggles, let us not be overcome by negativity, but rather as Paul instructed us, "let us take captive every thought to make it obedient to Christ" (2 Corinthians 10:5) and through that experience the joy that our Lord promises.



Visit to Ashabhavan

Shawn and I had the good fortune to visit Ashabhavan in July of this year and this article is a firsthand summary of our experiences and impressions during this visit. Our motivation to make time for such a visit stemmed from the sermons we heard from Anish Achen when he was the Vicar of our church. Achen encouraged the congregation to dedicate at least 1 day of our Kerala vacation for Mission related purposes. In fact, Anish Achen also accompanied us on our visit to Ashabhavan despite his busy schedule.

We are sure all of you know what Ashabhavan is and that our Women's Fellowship is supporting this charity. However, it is not until we made the visit that we realized how huge and important this mission is as a center for differently abled children with varied physical and mental capabilities. The facility is situated near Kottayam – Ettumanoor, and once you enter the gates you will notice how huge the complex is. It is a multi-story building with facilities such as classrooms, mess hall, auditorium, teachers' rooms, activity rooms, etc. There is a chapel as well as a cottage in the compound, so basically it has everything that is needed to run a well-established school. It started with 8 children few years ago and today over 40 children and adults ranging from ages 6 to 40 study there. Most children are from nearby areas; their parents drop them at the school in the morning and they pick them up in the evening after the school is over, just like any other school.

We reached Ashabhavan around 11 am, and we were greeted by Mr. Shaji George who is the Program Coordinator and Mrs. Sajina Koshy the Convenor of Ashabhavan. Sajina is a retired MRF employee who has dedicated her life for Ashabhavan. They gave us a complete tour of the building, showed us various rooms and introduced us to few of the teachers and students. The students were eager to see us, and they greeted us with open arms and smiles. There are more girls than boys (28 girls and 12 boys) in the school at this time and their challenges range from cerebral palsy, autism, down syndrome to intellectual disability. We saw 2 boys to whom their father had given poison when they were young but thankfully, they survived. We saw a 6-year-old who is paralyzed from the waist down. We came to know about a family in which all 3 children are mentally challenged. We saw a 6-year-old boy who has down syndrome and needs individual attention as he cannot even draw properly. These are just a few examples of the many children and their challenges that we saw firsthand. However, even in the mist of their challenges the children seemed very energetic, curious, and always kept a smile on their face.

We saw the children making arts and crafts which are available for sale at a very nominal price. We saw a group of children and staff hand-stitching a saree which I bought and brought back with me to Canada to be presented at the upcoming Harvest Festival auction. We had lunch with the children and staff after which a short meeting was convened to formally introduce us to the children. The children displayed some of their talents like singing, dancing, gym activities, etc.

Ashabhavan staff include 2 trained teachers, 2 vocational teachers, 2 therapists, 2 ayahs, 1 driver, 1 cook, 1 hostel warden and many voluntary workers. A physiotherapist comes to help the students with sciatic nerve issues, facial problems, etc. Each of these staff members have dedicated their life to the service of these children. The center's monthly expenses run into approximately 1.5 Lakhs INR. (approx. 2500 CAD). Mr. Shaji mentioned that they were trying to procure equipment to improve the facilities and to provide better physical development for the children.



The 4 to 5 hours that we spent was an eye opening and humbling experience for us, and we encourage all of you to make a visit to Ashabhavan when possible. We should all be proud that our CSI Madhya Kerala Diocese is supporting such a noble cause. We can all also be part of this movement to recognize differently abled people and do whatever we can in our capacity to make them feel loved and cared for.

We want to thank our dear Anish Achen for encouraging us to visit Ashabhavan and for accompanying us on the visit. We also want to thank Mr. Shaji, Mrs. Sajina and all teachers and staff of Ashabhavan for making our visit so special. Thanks to the children for their energy and enthusiasm in displaying their talents. Above all, thanks to God Almighty for giving us the opportunity to see this place and its operations firsthand and ground us in reality as to how blessed our lives are. Let us not take that for granted.
